6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Since R. J. Tibrewal Commerce College (RJTCC) is affiliated to Gujarat University, there is little scope left for curriculum development on our own. However, many of the faculty members of the college have got membership at the Board of Studies not only at Gujarat University but also at other Universities like Nirma University, Kadi Sarva Vishvavidhyalaya, Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University etc. – a body working for preparing syllabus. They positively influence in the field of the development of curriculum, preparation of course content and study material for the subjects of Soft Skills and Foundation Courses for each of six semesters. The College management motivates its staff members and provides all the necessary facilities and permissions required for participation in exercise related to curriculum development. Faculty members are also involved

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Teachers are motivated and instructed to adopt teaching methods that suit need of the subject. Faculty members are preparing teaching plan in advance to ensure coverage of entire curriculum. Information regarding seminars, workshops is disseminated amongst students from time to time. Students are also encouraged to make presentations in class as also at various seminars. Multimedia and audio visual devices are used for the project work, group discussion and field work.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

An examination committee is formed to conduct internal examinations. A pre-planned schedule is provided to the students well in advance for mid semester examination and is conducted in two sets pattern. Transparent policy regarding calculation of internal marks is in place. University examinations and evaluation have been conducted regularly and the faculties of the college have significant contribution for conducting university examinations and in evaluating answer sheets.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The college encourages and provides all required assistance to its teachers and students to participate in all research related activities as also for professional development.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Sufficient number of computer system is provided in administrative area, staff room. Computer Laboratory has LAN system and broadband internet facility is provided in all systems. Open access systems are provided to the students in the library and e-book bank is maintained. A list of new arrivals is displayed on notice board of library. Library is equipped with kindles that provide host of resources for students and teachers.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The teaching staff members have shown upward mobility in enhancing their academic profile by authoring books, contributing to research papers, articles in news-papers/magazines, delivering lectures as resource persons and also by perusing Ph. D. many professional courses. Administrative staff members are also updating their knowledge by improving their knowledge including computer literacy.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

University and state government rules are followed for staff recruitment. In order to run the institution smoothly, ad-hoc and temporary appointments are made, where required.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The college provides them proper infrastructure to guide our students as regards opportunities in various areas for the benefit of the students. 7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

RJTCC has made innovation in form of introducing ideas, practices in order to add and improve the standard of education in general and inculcate values of social service. NSS unit of RJTCC became active right from its inception and year after year, the numbers of programmes undertaken have increased. During 2016-17, 50 different activities were carried out by NSS Unit.

NSS Gram Shibir at Khadiyarapura for 7 days from 05-02-207 to 11-02-2017 has trained students to serve the community as also to take part in various activities of the college and has created positive impact on the behavior of other students as well.

List of 50 activities of NSS unit shows innovative approaches of help to society and that had very positive impact on the functioning of institution as more people were motivated to serve the community.

Collection of 131 bottles of blood at blood donation camp at College on 28-01-2017 has encouraged students to contribute more for a cause as also guided students to maintain good health to be able to donate blood regularly.

Participation of student in Republic Day Parade has encouraged other students to participate in NSS and NCC activities.

Republic day and Independence day celebration at College or other premises have increased feeling of brotherhood amongst students.

Increased extension activities has resulted in making students realize their social responsibility right from young age.

On the basis of suggestions/ action decided upon at the beginning of the academic year 2016-17, the following remains the outcome by the end of the April 2017.

- To increase momentum of activities of NSS.
 Number of NSS activities during 2016-17 has increased substantially as can be seen from the figures of activities given elsewhere in this AQAR.
- 2) To train and provide recruitment oriented opportunities to undergraduate and post graduate students of commerce faculty.
 - Faculty members of RJTCC Dr. Urmish Javeri motivated students to participate in Finance and Management related Competitions at University and National level.
 - Many educational visits were organized to make students familiar with what is happening in the outside world.
 - To concentrate and arrange for recruitment drive in the college premises for undergraduate and post graduate students, many companies were invited on campus to guide students about the opportunities available to them and to recruit them. Many students were selected by some of the prominent companies.
- 3) Administrative Reforms: For support staff, training in computer, communication and other soft skills organised at regular interval to enable them to serve students well.
- 4) Examination Reforms: Continuous improvement in quality of conduct of examination was ensured by setting two sets of papers and strict invigilation.
- 5) Promoting Research and publication activities: Teachers were encouraged and motivated to undertake research and publication activities. As a result, many books are authored by teachers of the college. Many of college teachers were invited by Gujarat State School Textbook Board, Gandhinagar to author books for Std. XI/XII, review books and act as experts in their respective subjects.
- 6) Faculty Development Programmes: Support in the form of making available books, journals, e-books and other infrastructural facilities resulted into all round development of teachers whereby many of them were invited by prominent institutions like the Gujarat University, Nirma University, Kadi Sarva Vishva Vidhyalaya, Dharmasinh Desai University, Institute of Chartered Accountants of India and Gujarat Chamber of Commerce for their contribution. Kindle facility is made available for students and staff members for ease in reading of e-contents.
- 7) Promoting "Start up" and "Skill India" programmes: Students were encouraged to garner varied skills to make themselves employable. They were also encouraged to develop entrepreneurial spirit. They were guided to attend many related programmes at Ahmedabad Management Association (AMA) and other places.
- 8) Cleanliness Drive: College campus is maintained very well and cleanliness is next to godliness is enshrined in the mind of teachers and students. As a result, the College has one of the cleanest campuses in the City.

- At RJTCC internal examinations have been conducted with question papers in two sets. Two-set Test has been a tradition since 1995-96 and strict invigilation is observed. It is a matter of pride that we have been able to continue the practice and that too with great success.
- (ii) Advancement and updating knowledge by Faculty members has always been a top priority at RJTCC. During 2016-17, Prof. Surabhi Pillai continued to enjoy duty leaves for pursuing her Ph. D. program till 06-07-2017 as part of XIIth plan of UGC. Research paper writing, their presentation using multimedia techniques at state and national as well as international level conferences/ seminars and their publication in journals/ book have been a regular practice among faculty member of RJTCC. Teachers were encouraged to participate in seminars or workshops or conferences and are provided with duty leave, registration fee and other infrastructural facilities.

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

As a regular practice and formal tradition, though environmental audit is not conducted at RJTCC we take proper care for the conservation of environment.

- a) NSS Students have organized tree plantation programs.
- b) An inherent discipline is inculcated among students for being economical about the use of electricity. They believe in not spoiling benches, walls, staircases and lecture halls of college premises. They make it a point not to disturb residential premises beside the college by not honking.
- c) The well planned architecture of the college helps having proper light and aeration in lecture halls. As a result electricity is sparingly used. Even computers are meticulously switched off after use.
- d) Water is judiciously used strictly avoiding its waste and resulting dirt and hazard for
