

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

As R. J. Tibrewal Commerce College (RJTCC) is affiliated to Gujarat University, there is a little scope left for curriculum development on our own. However, many of the faculty members of the college have got membership at the Board of Studies – a body working for preparing syllabus. They positively influence in the field of the development of curriculum, preparation of course content and study material for the subjects of Soft Skills and Foundation Courses for each of six semesters. The College management motivates its staff members and provides all the necessary facilities and permissions required for participation in exercise related to curriculum development. Faculty members are also involved in framing syllabus for schools of Gujarat Secondary and Higher Secondary Education Board.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Teachers are motivated and instructed to adopt teaching methods that suit need of the subject. Faculty members are preparing teaching plan in advance to ensure coverage of entire curriculum. Information regarding seminars, workshops is disseminated amongst students from time to time. Students are also encouraged to make presentations in class as also at various seminars. Multimedia and audio visual devices are used for the project work, group discussion and field work.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

An examination committee is formed to conduct internal examinations. A pre-planned schedule is provided to the students well in advance for mid semester examination and is conducted in two sets pattern. Transparent policy regarding calculation of internal marks is in place. University examinations and evaluation have been conducted regularly and the faculties of the college have significant contribution for conducting university examinations and in evaluating answer sheets.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

The college encourages and provides all required assistance to its teachers and students to participate in all research related activities as also for professional development.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Sufficient number of computer system is provided in administrative area, staff room. Computer Laboratory has LAN system and broadband internet facility is provided in all systems. Open access systems are provided to the students in the library and e-book bank is maintained. A list of new arrivals is displayed on notice board of library.

The teaching staff members has shown upward mobility in enhancing their academic profile by authoring book, contributing to research papers, articles in news-papers/magazines, and also by perusing Ph.D., and many professional courses. 1) To increase momentum of activities of NSS.

Number of NSS activities during 2015-16 has increased substantially.

- 2) To train and provide recruitment oriented opportunities to undergraduate students of commerce faculty
- Faculty members of RJTCC Prof. Vatsal Shukla and Prof. V S Shah motivated students to participate in Finance and Management related Competitions at university and National level Students participated and excelled in competitions like MONETA-2015 organized by R A Podar College Mumbai and many other events. Prof. Vatsal Shukla also accompanied students during Moneta-2015.
- Many industrial/educational visits were organized to make students familiar with what is happening in the outside world.
- To concentrate and arrange for recruitment drive in the college premises for commerce undergraduate students. Many companies were invited on campus to guide students about the opportunities available to them and to recruit them. Many students were selected by some of the prominent companies.
- 4) Administrative Reforms: For support staff, training in communication and other soft skills organised to enable them to serve students well. Administrative staff members were continuously guided by computer faculty to sharpen their skills related to information technology.
- 5) Examination Reforms: Continuous improvement in quality conduct of examination was ensured by setting two sets of papers.
- 6) Promoting Research and publication activities: Teachers were encouraged and motivated to undertake research and publication activities. As a result, many books are authored by teachers of the college. Many of college teachers were invited by Gujarat State School Textbook Board, Gandhinagar to author book, review books and act as experts in their respective subjects.
- 7) Faculty Development Programmes: Support in the form of making available books, journals, e-books and other infrastructural facilities resulted into all round development of teachers whereby many of them were invited by prominent institutions like the Gujarat University, Nirma University, Kadi Sarva Vishva Vidhyalaya, Dharmasinh Desai University, Institute of Chartered Accountants of India and Gujarat Chamber of Commerce for their contribution.
- 8) Promoting "Start up" and "Skill India" programmes: Students were encouraged to garner varied skills to make themselves employable. They were also encouraged to develop entrepreneurial spirit. They were guided to attend many related programmes at Ahmedabad Management Association (AMA) and other places.
- 9) Cleanliness Drive: College campus is maintained very well and cleanliness is next to godliness is enshrined in the mind of teachers and students. As a result, the College has one of the cleanest campuses in the City.
